



Last month, confusion spread throughout Modesto, a fear that Modesto's oldest business. J.S. West, was closing entirely. The landmark Ninth Street feed mill operation has closed, but J.S. West as a company remains in business. J.S. West has closed their feedstore at 709 Ninth Street, a Modesto institution since 1958. Modesto has learned of the closures of many local businesses lately, so for this edition the MM&HS Newsletter, we tell the story of a family that's number one concern is selling a much-needed product to the local community, and has also been successful in many areas over the past century. This is a history of J.S. West.



Nona & J.S. West



James Stewart "J.S." West was born in Bentonville, Ohio, on February 20, 1856. As a young boy, the family relocated to Nebraska. It was there that James met his future wife Nona Lesh (1866-1954); they married on June 11, 1889. Together they would raise five children: Vera (1890-1971), Virgil "Bill" (1893-1955), Norman (1895-1957), Nona (1898-1981), and Donald (1908-2007). After a brief stay in Oklahoma, J.S. moved his family to the drier climate of California in 1908.

J.S. suffered from consumption (a descriptor for tuberculosis at the time) and felt the weather would benefit him greatly. He settled on Modesto as he found the public ownership of water and power appealing. In 1909, he purchased a small warehouse on Front Street, now Ninth, between "H" and "G" Streets, from Merced Milling Company. The location of the J.S. West has not moved from this location in one-hundred thirteen years, the family has expanded the business into numerous other areas.


Whether it was it was feed or hay for farmers, wood and coal in the winters, J.S. West looked for needs in the community and found a way to fill the void. J.S. opened an ice plant on Ninth Street early on which operated until 1950. The family has sold tires, cars, appliances, paint, and more. J.S. West retired in 1925, and left the business to his son, Norman, to run. In 1926, daughter Nona's husband C. Harvey Benson (1896-1986) was brought into the company and fuel oil was added to the coal and wood department. In 1930, a new feed mill was constructed to expand livestock and poultry feed. J.S. West died on August 5, 1942, when his Packard vehicle was struck by a train at the Ninth Street tracks, adjacent to where he began his business in Modesto.

Immediately following this tragic event, Norman, Benson, and son Donald, assumed ownership of the company. By the mid-1940s, the company was divided amongst them, and three corporations were formed for each of their main areas of operation, which now encompassed animal feed, ice, appliances, tires, propane sales, and a service station.











J.S. West Equipment & Service Truck c. 1925




J.S. West Service Station Facing "H" Street

The family further diversified with furniture store in 1951, including a bargain annex for used goods. A devastating fire in June 1957 destroyed most of the West property, but they soon re-built. The J.S. West Furniture and Appliance store expanded to the large headquarters on Ninth and "H" Street. The building remains standing, though the store closed in 2001. The West family also backed on Ethan Allen Furniture Store on Sisk Road in Modesto, and had a J.S. West Furniture Store in Sonora, where they also maintain a propane sales outlet today.









No matter the venture, J.S. West has remained a family business. Leadership further passed to grandsons Robert Benson (1928-2019), James S. West (1935-2016), and D. Gary West, and all in part lead the company. Donald West worked until two weeks before he passed away in 2007 at age 98. Donald's greatest legacy, his grandson Mike told us, was the expansion of the egg business. Mike's father, Gary, brought efficiencies to the egg business and helped form Nucal Foods, the largest distributor of shell eggs in the Western United States. The closing of the feed store on Ninth Street in Modesto is the end of an era, but the family business continues. There was simply no longer a need for the store downtown. Now as the largest privately owned propane company in the state, Mike West continues to see growth in the company and sees future generations of the family taking the reins.




### Joseph Venturini March 10, 1930-September 12, 2022
