


# A Knights Ferry Tale

The McHenry Museum & Historical Society (MM&HS) has a mission to promote the history of Stanislaus County. One of our most historically celebrated communities is that of Knights Ferry. Willms Ranch is one of the most historic and iconic locations in this community. The Willms Family began a restoration of the historic home in 2008. It was the dream of the late Marjorie Desmond Willms, along with publishing the history of the family, and the ranch.



Knights Ferry






Marjorie Desmond entered this world January 27, 1921, in Taber, Alberta, Canada. She was the second child born to Jack (1886-1965) and Mabel (1901-1979) Desmond. Weighing in at a mere four pounds, it was said Marjorie was small enough to fit in a shoe box, as we learn when she grew, she became an unstoppable lifeforce. In 1923, her family visited an aunt in Modesto and decided to stay. The Desmond Family settled in Hickman until they moved to Knights Ferry in 1928 and raised turkeys. Marjorie attended Knights Ferry Grammar School and later Oakdale High School, graduating in 1939. She worked on the school's yearbook, *The Oracle*, and thus began her passion for writing and reporting which she would nourish for decades to come.

In August 1938, Marjorie received a letter from the Newspaper Institute of America in New York stating she had a favorable report after submitting a Writing Ability Test. They said she showed an unusual promise for one so young and with proper training "should carry you to success as a writer for publication". Marjorie was also a member of the California Scholarship Federation and wrote and directed a play. Just before graduation she met her future husband, Arthur Raymond "Ray" Willms (1913-1994) and they were married November 21, 1941, in Sparks, Nevada.

Raymond and Marjorie began their family, which would grow to five children: Shirley Willms McPhee, Barbara Willms Barbagelata, Gary Willms, John Willms (1951-2017), and Carolyn Willms Lopez. They lived their family life at Willms Ranch, which was established in 1852 prior to Stanislaus County being formed out of Tuolumne County. Their brand (KW) was the first brand issued in Tuolumne County. If it was not enough to help run a ranch and raise five children, Marjorie entered yet another profession which would be her longest contribution to Knights





In 1948, Knights Ferry celebrated it's onehundred-year celebration and Ray and Marjorie were two of many who were instrumental in the planning of the festivities. It was with the centennial, Marjorie began to write about the history of the community. Suddenly, she was recruited by the Stockton Record, followed by the Modesto Bee and then the Oakdale Leader. What was her job? She was to report on all the news, minus traffic accidents, which occurred in Knights Ferry. Her children wonder to this day if their mother ever slept. Marjorie worked on the ranch, took care of the children, was a member of the Knights Ferry Mother's Club, a Scout Leader, was a member of both the grammar school and High School PTA and later President. With all of that to do, if there was a call for a newsworthy event, Marjorie Willms was on the scene. She would pile the children in her car and head to the story, one of her most dangerous coverages was the 1955 flood. Ray recorded the weather for Knights Ferry for years and the Willms Ranch was a National Weather Station and he reported the weather to a Sacramento television station. Marjorie's dedication to her craft knew no bounds this included setting up a dark room in the closet of her daughter's bedroom to develop all photographs to run with her story. She never stopped!



On top of all her reporting, Marjorie and Ray were still very civically minded. Preserving local history was a top-priority. They, along with five other couples, were founding members of the Knights Ferry History and Museum Society, and one group project included the restoration of the Napier Home which was one of the oldest homes in the area. Marjorie was one of the founders of the Oakdale Cowboy Museum and served on the board of the Stanislaus County Historical Society and later the MM&HS. She was also a charter member of the Oakdale Museum Society in 1983. Adding to that she helped with the Gladys L. Lemmons Senior Community Center in Oakdale. Age never slowed Marjorie down, following the death of her husband Ray in 1994, she continued to record the weather for the area.


One of Marjorie's greatest accomplishments was her book, *Touring Knights Ferry with Tom* in 1976, she printed 1,000 and sold them all. To continue to list the accomplishments and the activities of Marjorie Desmond Willms could be exhausting. Her family continues to marvel at how her mother got so much work done. Marjorie Desmond Willms passed away on January 28, 2004, a day after her eighty-third birthday. Now, her legacy continues with the preservation of Knights Ferry and Family history. Front page news on January 2, 1923, was the announcement of the death of one of Stanislaus County's most prominent pioneers and dairymen, Valentine B. Dale of Salida, who passed away at age eighty-six on December 31, 1922. What is Mr. Dale's legacy to local history? Dale Road, a major throughfare, is named in his honor. On January 1, 1973, it was announced in The Modesto Bee that the university in Turlock which had recently had its name changed to California State College, Stanislaus would most like undergo a name change once again to California State University, Stanislaus. One wonders this projection came to fruition. On January 1, 2013, late historian Colleen Stanley Bare (1925-2018) wrote her column for *The Modesto Bee* on the New Year's Eve parties the McHenry Family threw over the years, once again reminding us of yet another story of Modesto's most celebrated family.

AT SALIDA

SALIDA, Jan. 2.—Valentine Burnett Dale, one of the old and highly respected settlers of Stanislaus county, died Sunday afternoon at his home in Salida. He was 86

his home in Salida. He was 85 years of age.

Mr. Dale, a native of Carroiton, Ga., fought in the confederate army, losing an arm in the service.

In 1858 he married Miss Susan Henon. They came to California in 1859. His wife and son, John, died in 1921.

He is survived by seven children, W. C. Dale, Modesto; Miston Dale, Porterville: Mrs. Emma Dockery. Santerville: Mrs. Emma Dock

Elmore, Modesto; Milton Dale, Por-terville; Mrs. Emma Dockery, San-ger; Mrs. Susis Hayward, Fresno; Mrs. Nina Graham, Salida, and Floyd C. Dale, Salida. For 52 years he lived on the Dale ranch near Salida. Three years ago he bought a home here and moved into town. He was one of the county's most prominent dairy-

men. The funeral service was held this afternoon. Interment was in Citizens cemetery here. The Rev. H. M. Bruce, pastor of the Centenary Methodist Church, and the Rev. Z. J. Needham took charge of the bur-

ial service.
